CRP Emergency Grazing Extended to November 30 in Kansas

an J. Polansky, State Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Kansas ounced today that emergency grazing of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acreage has n authorized to **extend to November 30, 2012** from the original September 30th final date.

August 29th, USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that "[in order] to assist producers, DA is permitting farmers and ranchers in drought stricken states that have been approved for ergency grazing to extend grazing on CRP land through November 30, 2012, without incurring additional CRP rental payment reduction."

cause of the severe and ongoing drought conditions, **emergency grazing** in approved Kansas nties is allowed through November 30, 2012" stated Polansky. The emergency grazing ension applies to eligible practices except for continuous practices. Polansky added, "The sas FSA State Committee completed the emergency grazing authorizations in all Kansas nties on July 20th as a result of the D2 Severe Drought designations." As of August 28, 2012, a d portion of Kansas has elevated to D3 and D4 on the U.S. Drought Monitor. ticipants shall leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous CRP fields ungrazed for life, or graze not more than 75 percent of the stocking rate as set by the Natural Resource servation Service. All livestock must be removed by the end of this grazing period. Producers out livestock may rent or lease the grazing privileges.

Secretary of Agriculture announced on July 11, 2012, the payment reduction cost for ergency having and grazing was reduced from 25 percent of the rental payment per acre to 10 cent for the 2012 year.
