According to KQ2-TV, it all started in 1991 when Atchison native Bob Staley was challenged by two local men to see who could shuck corn the fastest. Staley beat both men and won \$200. The event has been held ever since. He says that is has evolved so much, that he was able to raise over \$3,000 for the school last year.

Many competitors believe that it is a way to keep the practice of corn shucking alive in an age where machines do most of the work on the farm. Each participant, whether it be adult or child, had ten minutes to shuck corn, with some of the more practiced participants clearing over forty cobs a minutes.
