Producer Workshop on Land & Stream Health to be held in Nemaha County

The Delaware River and Tuttle Creek Watershed Restoration and Protection Strategy (WRAPS) programs will host a one-day producer workshop on January 15, 2019, at the Nemaha County Community Building in Seneca, KS. The workshop will feature nationally recognized soil health advocate Gail Fuller, a no-till farmer near Emporia, KS, since the mid-1980's who utilizes regenerative soil health practices in his operation.
