The value that our Earth Team volunteers contributed to NRCS was nearly \$1.4 million."

Created in 1985, the Earth Team Volunteer Program offers many opportunities to individuals over the age of 14 interested in helping improve the Nation's natural resources.

Woodrich said she hopes National Volunteer Week will motivate others to volunteer to help NRCS with their conservation mission.
